### **How Can It Help You?**

1. By helping the Police to help you.
2. Developing community spirit and cooperation.
3. Lower house insurance premiums, if you live in an active Watch area.
4. Making Smartwater accessible. a way of marking property, even small items such as Jewellery, which can be traced even if you move house.
5. Ringmaster, an email, text message and telephone scheme, which alerts everyone to crimes and scams in the area and provides feedback on crime.

### **How can you help?**

1. Attend a community meeting in Felmersham Village Hall details of which will be delivered to each house when they are available.
2. Report all suspicious incidents, no matter how trivial, to the Police.
