## Pride in our Parish

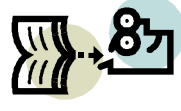

### **Parish Council Meeting**

The meeting of Felmersham and Radwell Parish Council on 15<sup>th</sup> May was held in St Mary's Church. The meeting opened with the swearing in of the new Council. Councillors Thomas, Pipe, Cook and Hartop were present. Councillors Keeble, Spoor and Hulatt had been sworn in previous to the meeting.

Although quorate, it was decided to postpone the election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman to the next meeting when more members of the Council would be present. Mr Hartop will continue as Chairman until then.

Items discussed:

Pinchmill Lower School wishes to seek Trust Status.

Gravel extraction. A County Council presentation was held in the Village Hall following a request from the Parish Council, as Beds County Council had not included Felmersham in their programme of consultation. Over 100 people visited the exhibition. Letters in response from the Parish Council had been sent. The Chairman had attended a meeting arranged by residents in Radwell and another in Carlton. 120 people attended the meeting arranged by Felmersham resident Brian Smith. The meetings gave rise to a great deal of correspondence. Individuals should write to Beds County Council. A letter would be sent to Andrew Brown of Beds County Council stating that despite the time extension for consultation, it was still insufficient in the light of the information given to residents of the parish and surrounding areas.

Highways – pot holes have been marked for repair. The Clerk has requested that weeds in the gutters in Marriotts Close be removed. The footpath was also in poor repair. The yew tree in the churchyard needs trimming as buses are forced into the centre of the road. The Parish Plan Action Group is requesting the PC seek a 20mph limit through both villages. This will be on the agenda for the next meeting. The Causeway repairs had been completed, but anger was expressed over the time the road had been closed. The Borough Council have not responded to several requests to sweep roads in the villages. Drain clearing is still a problem.

Councillor's Reports - Borough Councillor Brandon reported that the wind farm application was due to go before the Planning Committee on 11<sup>th</sup> June.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> July in Pinchmill Hall at 7.30 pm.

### **A Testing Time**

Recently we had a very pleasant afternoon visit to one of the Oxford Colleges. At the end of our visit we attended Evensong sung in the traditional form in the college chapel. A most enjoyable visit, but one in which we were reminded that this was the season of examinations. Relatively few students were around, and we were told that they were busily revising for the papers that they would all too soon be writing. I was reminded that in many of our families this would also be a time when many, both students and their families, would be undergoing the annual trauma of examinations. It is for many a time of testing, and of finding out just how much of the previous year's work has been taken in. I wish all the candidates every success, and hope that they and their families soon recover to resume the normal patterns of life.

It is also a time when many are contemplating great changes in their lives. Those taking their final school or university examinations will be thinking about moving on to new school, college or university, or new career. I am writing this close to Pentecost, when we remember the Holy Spirit coming to the disciples. Their lives were already changed by the time that they spent with Jesus, and what they learned from him. Now they were to embark on the task of continuing the work begun by Jesus, and through the coming of the Spirit they were empowered to set out on the work that continues through their successors today. We can have many hopes for the future, but we cannot know exactly what our future will be. Let us seek the coming of the Spirit into our lives to encourage, guide and support us to continue that work of discipleship that is the task of all who follow Jesus as Lord. You never know what may happen, but whatever it is there is certain to be adventure in it.

The guest speaker last month was Mary Whitehead who gave an enlightening and informative talk about the work of 'Keech Cottage' Children's Hospice. The Hospice provides much needed respite care, community nursing and bereavement support for more than 160 families throughout Bedfordshire, Hertfordshire and Milton Keynes. We were surprised at the many facilities available to the children and their families, and to learn that there is a conference centre and a hydrotherapy pool which can be hired out. It goes without saying that there was a very serious and thought provoking side to this talk. We were nevertheless left with a strong feeling that 'Keech Cottage' is a place full of love and joy where life is lived as much as possible to the full!

Next month the ladies of Felmersham & Radwell WI will be having an outing to Police Headquarters for a police dog training demonstration.

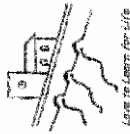

## Gravel Extraction Protest Meeting

Over 160 people attended the meeting held in the Village Hall on May 14th. Peter Hartop outlined the County Council's proposals for gravel extraction in the Upper Ouse valley and a lively question and answer period followed. It was suggested that two letters of protest should be sent by everyone, one for each site. Some 14 people volunteered to make follow-up visits around the Parish to help where needed and to remind everyone to send in their letters by the deadline, May 31st. We would like to thank all the volunteers for doing such a splendid job. We estimate that over 75% have written protest letters or emails (including the pupils of Pinchmill School see below). It is very gratifying to learn that due to local pressure Bedfordia have withdrawn MD48 Radwell/Milton Ernest site from the list. We do hope that the Council will not put the Chelington sites MD46 & MD49 on the shortlist when it goes forward for planning.

Trading standards have worked hard to push No Cold Calling Zones across the county - almost the whole county now has visible signs on the entry to towns and villages.

However this does not mean we can let our guard drop. The sign itself is just a warning it is up to the individual to take the necessary precautions and actions. It is not against the law for people to cold call. What we need to care about is those people intent to steal, or con us out of our money by giving a less than professional service. These people will offer all sorts of excuses to enter your home or offer you deals 'too good to refuse'.

Always check out unexpected callers even if they say it is an emergency such as "I need to turn the water off". If they are genuine they won't mind waiting. If offered a service at the door, by all means take their details but get at least two other quotes before having any work done.

## Sheds and Gardens

The usual pattern of crime for this time of year is an increase in thefts from sheds and gardens and although to some of you the message may seem repetitive you can be sure some people will get caught out by not taking the necessary precautions.

Don't leave garden equipment out to tempt the thieves. There is also the added danger that some implements can be used to break into the home. Ladders and garden spades being prime examples.

Sheds should have locks and alarms to the level that is suitable for the value of what is stored in them. There are often sports or garden equipment of high value secured only with a small padlock or in some cases NO lock at all !!

## A Guide On Making Calls To The Police

1. Any person wishing to make a report to the police whether it be as a victim of crime or to pass on suspicions should in the first instance contact the Call Handling Unit on 01234 841212. In the event of threat to life, or property, (as in a crime is in progress) - then calls should be made by dialling 999

2. The Call Handling Unit is manned 24hrs a day 7 days a week and the operators are trained in grading all calls and directing suitable responses. They are also able to forward messages to police staff with particular responsibilities i.e. Beat Managers, etc.

3. A Street co-ordinator should not be asked by his or her watch group to make telephone calls on behalf of others, as questions will be required from the caller which in the case of an incident, can only be answered by the Injured Party.
