The Ten Commandments

When I was young it seemed to me that the Ten Commandments were a way of restricting our freedom. I could appreciate that there had to be some rules if people were to be able to live in close communities, but it puzzled me that we spoke of the freedom given to us by God and then heard the commandments which appeared to restrict our freedom. As I have got older I have come to see that the commandments can be compared to a maker's manual for a car or for a complex piece of machinery. The manual tells how to run the equipment in the way which will enable it to function properly, and which will maintain it in a good working condition. Seen as a manual for life in a community the commandments show how to live in peace and harmony, and also how to maintain individual integrity. Just as ignoring the maker's manual may well lead to damage or early failure of the machine, so ignoring the commandments may lead to problems in the community and damage to the individual.

The commandment not to commit adultery is one which many regard as irrelevant to much of society today. It is surely no coincidence that divorce rates are rising, sexually transmitted disease rates are also very high, and the number of single parent families are also increasing. The cost in individual pain and suffering as well as the bad effects on the community is obvious for all to see, and the effects will be present for many years to come, even if there is a return to an understanding of the importance of this commandment and return to the keeping of it today.

The commandment not to covet is also often being ignored in the consumer society in which we live. The pressure to acquire more and more possessions is maintained through advertising and the manipulation of peer pressure. Surely an economy that relies on persuading people to buy more and more, and to dispose of goods rather than repair them is wasteful of the earth's resources and reliant on making people dissatisfied with what they have already got. It cannot be right that the debt burden is increasing to new heights, surely there will come a time when the bubble bursts, and there will be great unhappiness and poverty.

During the season of Lent let us take some time again to study the Ten Commandments, let us consider how important each one of them is to maintaining peace and harmony in our society, and let us work to promote them to ensure healthy living in our community

Organ Restoration

Since launching an appeal in 2004 for funds to restore the historic Nicholson pipe organ in St Mary's church, just over £16,000 has been raised locally, including donations received and pledged from Charitable Trusts and from two major companies in Bedford, who responded to our request for financial help. The cost is estimated to be approximately £47,000 and I am pleased to report that the Heritage Lottery Fund have granted us £30,900 so the project can proceed.

The organ was built in 1873 by John Nicholson of Worcester and, except for some minor alterations carried out in 1936, is virtually unchanged since it was built. Nicholson's are to undertake the restoration work hopefully starting in January 2007. As part of the Lottery grant, the PCC will hold an exhibition in the church about the organ and Nicholson's will provide an opportunity for viewing the innards of such a large musical instrument and how it is restored.

As some of you already know, there is good news about the children's home in Bapatla (formerly Goodwill Children's Homes) whose children many of you so generously support at Christmas time. Following a time of significant difficulties, a new charitable trust CHIT, which is closely linked with the Salvation Army, has been established which manages two homes.

There have been real financial hardships at Bapatla during the last two years: the children have had no new clothes, urgent repairs have had to be delayed and new children, many in desperate need of help, have had to be turned away.

What the home now needs in the short term is financial help to 'get back on its feet' via donations and sponsorships, so that they can once more admit new children, and give them the care they need. Mini Moto's, as they are known, are not toys! They are being used on footpaths and the road at speed, causing nuisance for local residents. Users who venture onto the highway (roads and footpath) may face prosecution.

They are classed as mechanically propelled vehicles and as such require the rider to hold a driving licence, insurance, MOT, number plates and crash helmet.

A constable can seize a motor vehicle for which the driver/rider does not have valid insurance or a valid driving licence, or a motor vehicle which he has reasonable grounds to believe is being used in a careless and inconsiderate manner, or is likely to cause, alarm, distress or annoyance.

Please think twice before purchasing a moto and if you do go ahead then please use it within the law and with your own and others safety in mind.
