### Troubles

It has been said that troubles do not come singly, many of the events of this year confirm the truth of this statement. The recent massive rises in fuel prices and threat of global fuel shortages have been followed by international financial problems and, for us, a very wet August which has made gathering the harvest difficult and expensive contributing further to the rising cost of living. Changes in climate are having a profound effect on agriculture and ecology.

I am sure that there are lessons here for us to learn, essential lessons if we are to have the security and peace that we all long for. The way of life given by God, and proclaimed in the Gospel is, I believe, the only way that we can all live in peace and harmony. Many of the difficulties and problems that beset us are the consequences of failing to follow God's way. The earth is rich with resources, and we have benefited from the exploitation of them, but we have also been very wasteful of many of these resources, and, particularly in the west, have developed a 'throw away' society. Rather than mend equipment or re-use the materials in that equipment we have thrown them away. Rather than get full use out of many of the items that we use we change them for the latest model, and dispose of the old one. We live in a generation that throws away rather than repair. So many resources are wasted and irrecoverable.

We have also become very wasteful of energy. The cheap energy that has been so available in recent years has led us to be profligate with it. Electrical equipment that is left on when not in use will be found in most households. The use of the 'stand-by' mode means that rather than switching equipment off it is left on unused for long periods of time, wasting power. We are now realising that the generation of energy by the burning of fossil fuels is altering our climate adversely, and also that our increased thirst for energy is leading to shortages of fuel as resources are used up.

I believe that we have become very selfish, and have failed to realise that our abuse and misuse of the abundant resources that God has given us has led to so many of the problems that we now face. We have, in reality, been living beyond our means. Others have seen the quality of our lives and want to emulate us, and this is making the situation worse. Those who 'have not' naturally want to become 'the haves'. Jesus tells us that we must love our neighbours as ourselves. Loving our neighbours demands that we care for our planet, and work for the equitable development and use of its resources in a way that does not damage it.

After a lengthy period of fund raising in the parish and with generous support from a number of charitable trusts, the PCC has contracted to install a disabled persons toilet and a kitchen in St Mary's Church. Space behind the organ is being used for the new facilities and a new robing area for the choir will be made in the north aisle of the Nave. Work is to commence in the first week of January 2009 and should be completed 12 weeks later i.e. before Easter. The church architect's plans for the work has been approved by the Diocese and English Heritage. The total cost of the project is close to £60,000. Repairs to a lintel in the tower steps will be undertaken at the same time.

We began with Constable's beloved Haywain and enjoyed the history and symbolism that often gets lost on paintings seen on too many place mats and calendars!

The affluent Dutch 17th century was portrayed in rich, sensual fabrics and costumes by Vermeer. The Impressionists were sharply contrasted with the Orientalists of the 1850's who revelled in depicting the Islamic lifestyle. ### **Fireworks**

With Bonfire Night and Diwali fast approaching, and Christmas and New Year soon after it seems appropriate to remind people of the laws regarding fireworks. It is a criminal offence to let off fireworks between 11pm and 7am and anyone breaking the curfew risks a fine of up to £5,000 or six months imprisonment.

The curfew applies all year round except for four "permitted firework nights", which extend the hours. These are Bonfire Night Nov 5<sup>th</sup> (extension until midnight), Diwali Day Nov 12<sup>th</sup> (1am), New Year's Eve (1am) and Chinese New Year Feb 9<sup>th</sup> (1am).

It is an offence for anyone under 18 to be in possession of fireworks in a public place and the police can issue fixed penalty notices to anyone breaking the law.

Fireworks will only be on general sale between October 15th and November 10th and for short periods around New Year, Chinese New Year and Diwali.

Finally, and more importantly, KEEP SAFE - Follow the Firework Code

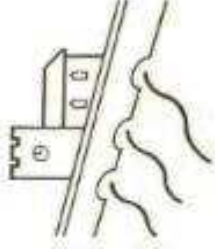
