### Memories

**Rev David G Mason**

At the beginning of September there was the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the beginning of the last world war. The event and the news stories around it brought back many memories to me. My memory does not extend back to the very beginning of the conflict, but I do remember being sent to live with my Aunt's family in Southport during 1941 when my Father was evacuated with his school to Nottinghamshire. We were near enough to hear Liverpool being bombed. Later, while living in Nottinghamshire I remember playing in the practice trenches that the Home Guard had prepared, and seeing masses of gliders being towed across the sky .here was the rationing that extended well after the war was over, I did not see a banana until an uncle who was abroad sent three in a parcel.

There was the bomb damage all too visible when we visited relatives in Sheffield. We got commissioned as officers when we collected sufficient waste paper, we wore our badges proudly. Then there were the pictures at the local cinema, pictures of battles, refugees, the awful pictures of Belsen at the end of the war. The joy of VE day, then VJ day, Fathers returning from the war. The resumption (for me the first experience) of 'normal' family life. Many memories, many good, some sad.

Next month, on the 8<sup>th</sup>, we will be holding our Remembrance Sunday Services at 10.15am in the Church and then at approximately 11.15am at the War Memorial. We will not only be remembering those who were killed or suffered, (many continue to suffer) in the two world wars, but also in the many conflicts that have occurred since, and which continue to occur throughout the world. It is not only important that we should remember the sacrifices made in the past, but also that we should re-dedicate ourselves to working to ensure peace in the future.

The changes in our climate should be challenging us to realise our inter-dependence, that we have to work together to ensure the survival of the planet on which we live. The very foundation of the Christian Faith is to love God, and to love our neighbours as ourselves. I believe that following this way is the only way in which we will achieve the peace and security that we all crave, and the only way though which we can work together to avoid damaging our world further.

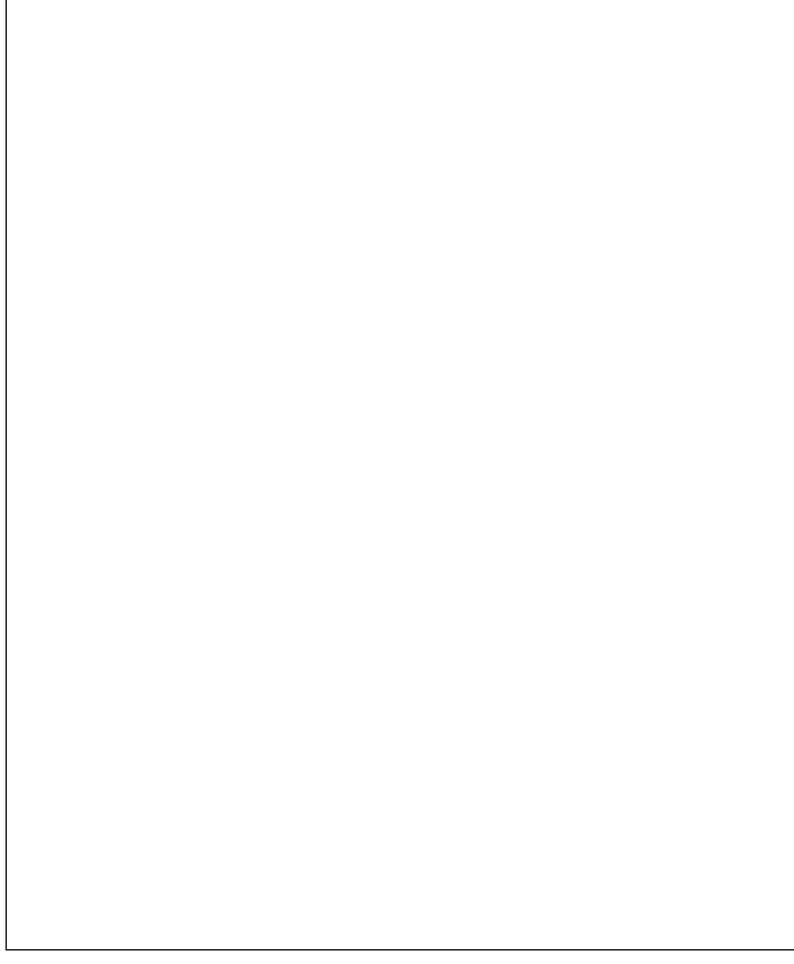

### **Parish Council meeting**

**During Parishioners Talk Time** the issue of dogs fouling the local verges and footpaths was discussed, in particular the footpath between Felmersham and Radwell and also alongside the river. These are popular walks for many people, including families with children, and should be pleasant experiences. Sadly this is not the case as dog owners are still not picking up their pets' messes. There are two dog bins in Felmersham, another adjacent to Felmersham bridge and one in Radwell, and it was suggested that a fifth bin be placed about half way along the Radwell Road. Until that is decided please be a responsible owner, use a 'poop scoop' and leave the footpaths clean and clear for other users. Vehicles speeding through the two villages was also discussed. SC Edwards suggested that anyone who sees a vehicle being driven at speed should record the registration number and the date and time and pass the information to him.

**Highways:** A request was received for a footpath along the southern end of the High Road. The Council will prioritise the issue of vehicles speeding through the parish. The footpath to Odell Mill will remain closed until next February while repairs to the bridge are carried out.
