The Lion And The Lamb

By the time that you are reading this we will all know whether the month of March has come in like a lion or a lamb this year. Those of you who are aware of old weather lore will be forecasting what the weather at Easter will be like, because Easter falls close to the end of the month of March. The lion of lamb are considered to be complete opposites, or to represent opposite characteristics. A person who was described as a lion is thought of one who is mighty and powerful, while one described as a lamb would be thought of as mild and gentle. Curious then that Jesus has been called the `Lamb of God', and also the `Lion of Judah'.

In his life and ministry Jesus certainly illustrated characteristics of both animals. In his dealings with difficult and dangerous situations Jesus showed great courage and strength. We can think of his approach to the demoniac at Gadara, the man who was so out of control that even chains could not hold him, and men were frightened when he was around. We can think of Jesus facing those who sought to keep him quiet; towards the end of Lent, in Holy Week, we will be thinking of Jesus before the Sanhedrin, and before Pilate, and then on the Cross. Here indeed was a man with the heart of a lion. But then there is also the character of the lamb. Jesus speaking of and demonstrating the power of love, resisting the call of the disciples to use his power to destroy those who were seeking to harm or reject him. Jesus going like a lamb to the slaughter on Good Friday. Jesus the lamb sacrificed on our behalf.

Easter comes at the beginning of April, and as we remember again the Easter story so we see in the events of that time evidence of both the lion and the lamb in Jesus. There is the regal entry into Jerusalem, the sorrow over Jerusalem, the throwing our of the money changers from the Temple, the Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, the arrest and trial, the Crucifixion, the Resurrection. In Jesus we see these apparently opposite characteristics combined to form the ideal pattern for anyone who would be a leader, or indeed for each one of us, whether leader or not. Strength and courage combined with humility and gentleness, all mediated by holy love and obedience to God as Father, an example for us all. It would be good if we could all resolve to observe Holy Week this year, and to relive in our hearts and minds the great and poignant events of that very special week, seeking to explore the lion and the lamb in each one of us, and to renew our relationship with God.

Dogs On Wildlife Trust Nature Reserves

What could be nicer than a gentle stroll in the countryside, with your faithful companion? In an ideal world, nothing. Except this is a far from ideal world! Under proper control, dogs present few problems on nature reserves but there is an every increasing attitude by owners to let their animals run free. This has several problems associated with it, including: disturbance to wildlife, to grazing stock and other visitors; dog faeces distributed across the site.

The Wildlife Trust has formulated a policy for dogs on their nature reserves: dogs will normally be allowed on Trust reserves on a lead and under close control;

owners must clear up after their dogs and faeces removed from the site.

Please abide by these rules for the sake of everyone especially the wildlife.
